Police: OKC man arrested for threats against Gov. Fallin over marijuana

An Oklahoma City man was arrested on St. Patrick's Day after officials say he threatened to kill Governor Mary Fallin.

Matthew Johnson, 27, was arrested around 11:00 Monday night after police were called by a friend.

According to police, the friend said Johnson threatened to kill Governor Fallin and any police officer he came in contact with. Police say Johnson was angry because the Oklahoma Governor would not legalize marijuana in the Sooner State.

Johnson was booked into the Oklahoma County Jail and, according to authorities, he continued to threaten officers.

A Sand Springs man was arrested Tuesday afternoon after emergency crews found his child dead on arrival at a home on West 6th Street.

Jobe Lee Jones, 20, told police that he fell asleep on a couch with his six-month-old son, Daethe Anthony Ray Jones, and when he awoke the child was not breathing. Jones told police he had gone to sleep about 12 hours before emergency crews arrived, said Mike Carter, asst. police chief.

Jones faces two felony complaints of child neglect, because a one-year-old was also in the residence, Carter said. That child is in protective custody.

Jones also faces misdemeanor complaints of marijuana possession and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Ingestion of marijuana by baby lands two in jail

A Tahlequah couple charged with felony child neglect were booked into jail Monday and bonded out soon afterward.

Prosecutors last week charged the two – James A. and Ashley N. Cosby, both 23 – after police took a report the couple's 1-year-old baby had ingested marijuana.

The child was taken to a local hospital and later transferred to a Tulsa medical facility, where he tested positive for tetrahydrocannabinol, or THC.

Court documents indicate James A. Cosby initially told a police officer the child had been with someone else during the day when the report was filed, so prosecutors have also charged him with misdemeanor counts of obstructing an officer. He faces a charge of possession of a controlled dangerous substance for allegedly having marijuana.

MOORE — Police arrested a Moore man after two boys told officers he accused them of stealing drugs, pulled a knife on them and forced them to take off their clothes.

The boys, ages 12 and 13, told police they were riding their bicycles Sunday in the area of 912 S. Southside Drive when a man asked them to stop and talk to him. The boys said the man took them to the back side of a residence and asked them if they had stolen marijuana from his vehicle, according to a Cleveland County District Court affidavit.


Police said the victims denied stealing anything, and the man pulled out a knife and pointed it at them. The man demanded they take off their clothing and empty their pockets.

One of the boys was wearing only his socks and the other was in underwear and socks when the man told them to leave the area, and they obliged, according to the affidavit.




Methods of Drug Ingestion



DHS Actions Scrutinized

Report probes complaints made prior to baby's death

Baby left with mother despite positive test for drug use

SEMINOLE — In a report on a Seminole baby's death, an oversight agency last week found DHS workers left the girl with her mother even though both had illegal drugs in their systems when the

child was born.

Tamberlyn Wheeler died three months after her birth in December 2007, showing major signs of malnourishment.

Her parents this year were charged with child neglect following an investigation made more complicated by the state Office of Chief Medical

Examiner's inability to determine cause of death.

"I think a lot of citizens think that when a new mother tests positive for drugs, her baby is picked up and not returned until the mother is better," said Lisa Smith, director of the Oklahoma Commission on

A report released Tuesday shows that Department of Human Services workers investigated the mother of a 10-day-old infant found dead in a washing machine six times before the baby's death on Nov. 4.

Among the complaints was a report that a relative had died in the home from a drug overdose and that other relatives failed to

report the death for seven hours because they were "shooting up speed" when the relative died.

The report, issued by the Oklahoma Commission on Children and Youth Office of Juvenile System Oversight on the death of 10-day-old Maggie Trammel, indicates there had been several reports regarding the care of Trammel and two other children, ages 5 and 8, in the home. The reports dated as far back as March 2009.

Trammel's mother, 20-year-old Lynsley Dawn Fiddler, is currently being held on \$100,000 bond on charges of child neglect.

Fiddler's case has garnered national attention since the baby's death was reported.

According to the OCCY report, the first complaint, which was made on March 27, 2009, stated that Fiddler's children were reported to have been absent from day care. Fiddler stated the children

had been sick.

"The reporter stated that Lynsley Fiddler and the children lived with a relative until about two or three weeks earlier when they were thrown out. The reporter was concerned about the children's safety," the report states.

DHS reportedly accepted the report and screened it out on April 4 as "Not Child Abuse/Neglect," and documented that "no information was given that stated the children's

welfare was at substantial risk of serious neglect or physical danger."

The second report, on Oct. 12, 2009, said that Fiddler and two other adults living in the home "all used drugs in front of the children" and that "the adults passed out from drug use" and that "one of the adults was so high that they fell asleep in their food."


